## Science Kits For Kids Make Learning Fun

My oldest daughter is in 2nd grade and is completely fascinated with science. So far in her budding academic career she has made all As in science and we love foster her love for science in as many ways as possible.

The [Young Scientists Club](#) makes award-winning science kits for kids that are both fun and entertaining. I wasn't familiar with their kits but they would make fantastic birthday and Christmas presents.

We were asked to review a couple of their kits and when I saw their Magic School Bus series, based on the popular animated TV show with Ms. Frizzle that appears on the Discovery Kids Channel, I knew this would be a hit at our house. The well-designed [kits](#) are reasonably priced at \$19.99. We reviewed the [Going Green kit](#), which taught us about recycling, creating paper, how mulch is formed, etc. Although it's designed for ages 5 and up (and intended for adult supervision) my 4-year-old also enjoyed the experiments. The kits also come with a full-color booklet with directions and other interesting scientific facts and are presented in a fun, captivating way for young learners.



We also reviewed another line of kits which are more reasonably priced but just as interesting and educational. The Explore Space kit (retails for \$9.99) was a big hit with my girls, especially creating a small constellation light box so we could view constellations with the aid of a flashlight. The Go Green Save The Earth Kit taught us more about recycling and would be a great learning aid for upcoming Earth Day this spring.
